1.	Welcome	KM welcomed all to the meeting. The meeting began at 6.30pm and was quorate. The meeting was held online.

Declarations of Interests	Kevin Moyes is Chair of Governors at Five Acres Primary School in Bicester, Carterton Primary School and Bloxham Primary School, He has also been commissioned to undertake work for the Ridgeway Education Trust. Gill Locke, Staff Governor, is also the school Business Manager. ET is training to be a SENCO and teaches at a (non-Trust) primary school in Watchfield.

6.	Matters arising not covered on the agenda	There were no new matters arising.		

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	Headteacher's Report	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> KA confirmed that there are currently 281 children on roll, and it is hoped that numbers exceed 300 in September. Staff absence has been low. This is most welcome as there is little capacity to provide cover. The school will be required to recruit two TAs. Recruitment of high-quality TAs has been a challenge in the past. A staff retirement in July is expected and a casual play worker has been recruited to support peak times in the after-school club. Brize Norton School will move to the Brize Meadow development, and they have increased their PAN from 20 to 30. Pupil Progress Meetings have been ongoing since February 10th. KA reports that staff arrive at meetings 'fluent' in the needs of their children. 2025 Phonics outcomes are expected to be higher than 80% KS1 Sats assessments will be completed again this year. Year 6 SAT predictions are Reading 94%, Writing 90%, Maths 84% and Combined 71% There have been three fixed term suspensions since the last meeting. Neglect remains the key safeguarding theme this term. Senior staff and the FSW attended an OCC Military Families Conference recently. Mid-year staff appraisals are underway. Enrichment visits to Hill End, Oxford Castle and Jonathan's Jungle have taken place. <p>A Governor asked for more detail about pupil numbers. GL confirmed that the school PAN is 315. There are currently 280 children on roll, but numbers should reach 309 when the census is completed in October 2025. The current 11 form structure will be able to cope with this growth without changing the leadership structure or hiring new teachers. Indeed, the school can grow to 315 without any increased staffing costs (perhaps one more TA will be needed, dependent on need).</p> <p>A Governor noted that the school needs to recruit a new TA and, in the past, recruitment has been a challenge. She asked if school is worried that this post may remain unfilled. GL explained that the school is creative and will 'cast the net wide'. Gateway is growing and provides many opportunities for ambitious recruits. Indeed, Gateway TAs often join the teacher training scheme. KA is confident that an appointment will be made.</p>	7.1. 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		<p>9.2 The key development issues continue to be:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> to maintain good teaching and learning and improve classroom practice. to continue to develop the school's ethos and values, enhance the reputation of the school and thus continue to enrol additional pupils. to continue to develop expertise in phonics. to sharpen pupil vocabulary and knowledge in all classrooms. <p>KM reminded Governors that the Development Plan continues to show Spring and Summer milestones for each of the identified areas for development.</p>																																					
9.	Governor updates since last meeting	<p>10.1 HL undertook a mathematics monitoring visit on 29th January. She met with Nikki Scovell to discuss how times tables are taught. HL notes that pupils practice their tables each morning, 'X tables Rockstars' is used to support this learning and Kate Magill (educational consultant) visits school to give sound advice to teachers and TAs.</p> <p>HL also reviewed maths mastery in Year 1 and EYFS, the use of white boards and the application of White Rose maths modules. She concludes 'The Headteacher and maths lead have high expectations of what should be seen in a maths lessons. They know the children and their needs. The maths lead is positive about Mastery in the Number programme in KS1 and is aware of how to consistently improve knowledge of times tables throughout the school'.</p> <p>10.2 HL completed a phonics data check 11th February. She notes that in Term 3, 44% of Year One children are at the expected level. Eight other children are only 5 marks away from the pass threshold. HL adds that phonics teachers and SLT have high expectations of teaching and learning and progress in phonics.</p> <p>10.3 HL completed a Term 3 data monitoring check. She visited classrooms and toured the school. 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		<p>She noted that movement around the site and classroom was well managed and that children received sensory breaks. The environment in all classrooms was positive and safe.</p> <p>10.5 KMa later met with Sarah Gardiner to explore the scope and some of the challenges faced by the inclusion team. These challenges often relate to the large numbers of children on the register. There are 47 children on the SEND register (an increase of 10) and this is above the national average. 14 children have EHCPS, and this is also above the national average. KMa concludes 'the inclusion work under Sarah's leadership continues to progress very well with continuous improvements being made and significant changes to school culture, attitudes and pupil impact'.</p> <p>10.6 KMa undertook a Pupil Premium monitoring visit on 6th February. She reports that £30,000 of PP funding has been invested in CPD aiming to develop quality first teaching and more robust and accurate assessment, £10,000 has been allocated to supporting phonics teaching and £7,300 on wider support including emotional support. 60% of the roll receive the Service Premium (£59,000). KMa notes that attendance of PP children is slightly lower than non-PP and Sarah Gardiner is considering a range on incentives such as free breakfast clubs.</p> <p>Governors asked KMa to join one of the PPM meetings during the next round of meetings. They also asked her to monitor phonics teaching and performance data and the Gateway reading scheme when she next visits.</p> <p>KM will undertake a website review</p> <p>10.7 and 10.8 The swimming audit and Sports Premium funding log was circulated before the meeting. 73% of the students surveyed are competent swimmers. Governors felt that Sports Premium funding has been invested wisely. It has met the school's priorities and has been invested in activities that have the greatest impact:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Playground equipment • Transport to fixtures and competitions • Professional sport coaching • Play leaders <p>Governors note that £8,500 will be carried forward and this will enable the 'good work' to continue.</p> <p>10.9 The Cambrian Trust School Support Partner visited on 12th February. She concludes the Personal Development is close to outstanding. Most other areas are 'securely good'. There are three 'orange' areas, and these relate to disadvantaged children, governance and finance. She will return on 13th March. She notes 'Gateway feels very calm, happy and safe'.</p> <p>10.10 The DfE attendance report was circulated before the meeting. This records a headline attendance percentage of 95.3% against a national average of 94.8%. Persistent absence is 7.3% against a national average of 14.1%.</p> <p>10.11/10.12 GL circulated the latest Budget Period 10 and 11 CFR summary before the meeting. The school has received additional TAG funding of £28,715 and £18,496 Additional High Needs top up funding. Additional Pupil Premium funding of £5460 has been made available. 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		<p>but this expense has been offset by the additional EHCPs earned thanks to the extra TA capacity.</p> <p>GL explained that the net position is a +£15,000 surplus going forward and this will enable the school to meet its repayment obligations to OCC. Another 'tight' year is expected but it may be possible to meet the repayment commitment by the end of next year. A Governor asked what issues had made the most financial impact. GL felt that wrap around care was the single greatest income factor and lower energy costs are the most significant expenditure reducing factor.</p> <p>A Governor noted that hiring and letting charges have increased. She asked if this has resulted in a loss of custom. GL explained that the school researched the hire charges of other schools, church halls and public spaces in Carterton and noted that Gateway was charging slightly below the market rate. The school is now in-line with competitors and there has been no protest from Gateway's established and trusted customers.</p> <p>GL reminded Governor that the Cambrian Trust will require a £3,000 charge for its services from September. Governors feel that this is excellent value for money and support this investment.</p> <p>GL noted that the solar panel installation has been delayed while the roof is re-surveyed. The 150 panels will place a significant strain on the buildings.</p> <p>10.11 KM reiterated the need to appoint a colleague to the Sustainability Governor Lead role and for them to form a working group (including staff, parent and ideally pupils).
